The Cherokee language is dying. This course is one of many efforts to revitalize, maintain, and support the Cherokee language.

Cherokee Speaking World is designed to introduce you to the Cherokee language and culture. In this course you will develop Cherokee speaking and listening skills.

II. Course Aims and Objectives:

Beginning conversation skills in Cherokee language; beginning writing and reading skills in Cherokee language; appreciation for the Cherokee language and culture.

By the end of the course, students will

Introduce themselves and others; identify and describe objects and people; discuss on-going, daily, future, and past activities; follow simple directions; comprehend and repeat simple narratives; discuss self and others.
