Agi-/Agw- Verbs
 Verbs that take Agi-/Agw- Set
 Pronouns in all Intransitive forms.

2. All the other Verbs

Verbs – Three of Five Stems

Verb Stems are made of a lexical Base with suffixed Stems.

These forms take Tsi-/G- Set Pronouns

Verbs – Three of Five Stems

How can we access the three Tsi-/G-Set Pronoun Stems?

Artificial Dialogues

Present: What is she doing?

Immediate: You do it!

Imperfective: Do you always do that?

What is he doing? He's eating a meal.

Oh. You eat meal, you hungry one! Okay, I'm eating a meal.

Do you always eat a meal? Yes, I always eat a meal.





adawo'a, vprs, dk, He is swimming bathing., [atawó:], g~a, bathe

adawosgv'i, vmpf, dk, She was swimming bathing., [atawó:], g~a, bathe

hadawotsa, vimd, dk, Swim Bathe!, [atawó:], g~a, bathe

Adawoa. ~ Gadawoa.

Adawoa. She's swimming.

Gadawoa. I'm swimming.

3rd Singular Pronoun and 1st Singular Pronoun

a- 'she/he' and g- 'l'

provide the information we need to predict all other pronouns for this Verb Word set.

Isolate the Present Stem

Adawoa. He is swimming.

Gadawoa. I am swimming.

g- ~ a- Pronoun Pattern indicates -adawoa 'is swimming Present Stem'

g-~a-a-Vowel Stem Pronoun Pattern

Recite 10 Present Verb Word Sentences

Gadawoa. I am swimming.

Hadawoa. You are swimming.

Adawoa. She is swimming.

Osdadawoa. He and I are swimming.

Otsadawoa. They and I are swimming.

Inadawoa. You alone and I are swimming.

Sdadawoa. You two are swimming.

Itsadawoa. You all are swimming.

Itsadawotsa! You all swim!

Vsgi Nigaa!

Vsgi nigaa! That's all.
